CONSTITUTIONAL STATUS AS DOMINIONS IN ANGLO-SAXON COMMUNITY OF NATIONS WITH POWER TO MAKE LAWS—NEW ERA DAWNS FOR MOTHER COUNTRY AND STATES BEYOND THE SEAS

### CELT AND SAXON JOIN HANDS TO MOULD EMPIRE'S DESTINY IN BRITISH ISLES AND OVERSEAS

Irish Agreement Gives Erin Same Constitutional Status as Dominions in Anglo-Saxon Community of Nations With Power to Make Laws—New Era Dawns for Mother Country and States Beyond the Seas

### DETAILS STILL TO BE WORKED OUT, BUT ACCEPTANCE IS NOT DOUBTED

LONDON, Dec. 6.—"Ireland shall have the same constitutional status in the community of nations known as the British Empire as the Dominion of Canada, the Commonwealth of Australia, the Dominion of New Zealand and the Union of South Africa, with a Parliament having powers to make laws for the peace, order and good government of Ireland, and an Executive responsible to that Parliament, and shall be styled and known as the Irish Free State."

Such is the first article of "a treaty between Great Britain and Ireland" which was signed, some minutes after two o'clock this morning, on behalf of Great Britain by Lloyd George, Austen Chamberlain, Lord Birkenhead, Winston Churchill, Sir Laming Worthington Evans, Sir Hamar Greenwood and Sir Gordon Hewitt, and on behalf of Ireland by Arthur Griffith, Michael Collins, Robert Barton, E. J. Duggan and Gavan Duffy. The signatures were affixed to the document in that historic room of 10 Downing street on whose walls hang the portraits of the greatest British Premiers of the past and of one American, George Washington.

A New Era Entered on.

It was that same room, Lord Birkenhead pointed out to-day, which witnessed the fateful and melancholy discussion that preceded the final recognition, on the part of the statesmen of this country, that the American colonies were lost. It was in that room, said the Chancellor of the Exchequer, in which the anxieties, uncertainties and vicissitudes of the war met with daily reflection that, yesterday, was entered upon, in my judgment, a new phase which promises, after all these bitter centuries and generations, that last an era may dawn which will enable us of our day and generation to say that we have not achieved less in settlement, here at our own doors, of an issue which seems, but is no less momentous than we have lived in the field of battle, than possessed the security and existence of these islands from the great Napoleonics period."

Lord Birkenhead, it may be stated, who a week after this morning brought his historic Cabinet room of the waiting group of newsmen the glad news that an end had been reached. There, not long ago, when the Chancellor was blockaded by Mr. Macphail, Progressive, in Southeast Grey, which has the honor of re-

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suming his seat.

## MEIGHEN GOVERNMENT SWEPT AWAY IN AN AVALANCHE OF PUBLIC SCORN; LAURIER MANTLE FALLS UPON KING

Great Tidal Wave Carries Liberals and Progressives to Victory From Coast to Coast—Liberalism in Majority

### FIVE PROVINCES OF CANADA WITHOUT SINGLE TORY SEAT

Hon. Mackenzie King Scores Great Triumph in East While Hon. T. A. Crerar Carries Prairies—Canadian Electors Call for Constitutional Government

OTTAWA, Dec. 7.—As the Premier's defeat was overwhelming, and he says he accepts the verdict of the people, it is expected that he will place his resignation in the hands of the Governor-General at once. The latter will naturally ask Hon. Mr. King to form a Cabinet.

The Meighen Ministry, which sought to govern Canada without the consent of the electors of the Dominion was swept out of existence at the polls yesterday and the Liberal party, under the leadership of Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, was given a mandate to take up the task of restoring constitutional government at Ottawa.

No greater political revolution has ever taken place as a result of a Canadian general election.

The Premier and eight of his colleagues were defeated at the polls.

### FIVE PROVINCES OUST TORIES.

In Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, Quebec, Manitoba and Saskatchewan no Conservative candidate was elected.

East of the Ottawa River and west of the Great Lakes, Conservatism as a political force has ceased to exist, save in the urban centres of British Columbia.

All that remains of the once-great party of Macdonald, Cartier and Tupper is concentrated in the cities and towns of Ontario, for the rural parts of this Province voted overwhelmingly for the Liberal and Progressive candidates.

### HUGE ANTI-MEIGHEN MAJORITY.

Only by the division of the opposition forces were many of the Conservatives in rural Ontario able to hold their seats. The popular vote when compiled will show a very great majority against the Government in the only Province in which the Conservatives made a stand against the tide of condemnation.

Verdict in Brantford.

The organization of the Government forces in the larger industrial centres—Toronto, Hamilton, London—enabled the party to carry all the seats in these cities, but in the smaller industrial cities, such as Brantford, where one of the most remarkable of the Liberal victories was won, the electors took the bit in their teeth and showed that they represented the endeavors of factory owners to direct the votes of their employees en bloc to the Conservative candidates.

Verdict in Brantford.

The Progressive wave in the West was scarcely less overwhelming than the Liberal tide that extinguished Conservatism in the East. Out of 43 seats between the Great Lakes and the Rockies the party led by Mr. Crerar is reported at an early hour on Wednesday morning to have carried 37—of which 18 are in Manitoba, 14 in Saskatchewan and 10 in Alberta. Returns from British Columbia are incomplete at the time of writing, but the Conservatives will do fairly well there and may bring up the total of the party's strength in the new House to approximately 60 seats.
